FAIRS Export Certificate Report

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Report Highlights:

This report lists the required export certificates for exports to Belgium, which are not EU harmonized. Export Certificate Matrix is included.

Section II. Purpose of Specific Export Certificate(s)

Belgium, as a member of the EU, conforms to all EU regulations and directives. We therefore recommend that this report is read in conjunction with the EU FAIRS Export Certificate Report (GAIN Report Number E60015), and the EU FAIRS Country Report (E57011) both produced by the US Mission to the EU in Brussels, Belgium (USEU). Unfortunately for exporters, the EU's rules on certification for imports are complicated and are not always harmonized across Member States. This report lists the required export certificates for exports to Belgium, which are not yet harmonized.

Both veterinary inspection and food inspection are within the domain of the Federal Agency for Food Safety (FAVV). The FAVV belongs to the Ministry of Social Affairs, Health and Environment. The Federal Public Service Health, Food Chain Safety and Environment of this Ministry is in charge of policy and legislation on food issues.

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Section III. Specific Attestations Required on Export Certificate(s)

For dairy products, USDA/AMS must first endorse the Public Health Attestation and then the exporter should take the Certificate to APHIS for endorsement.

Section IV. Government Certificate's Legal Entry Requirements

General principles of certification are laid down in Council Directive 2002/99/EC:

One of the principles is that: "The certificate must be issued before the consignment to which it relates leaves the control of the competent authority of the country of dispatch". This means that the Health Certificate must be issued and signed before the shipment which it relates to leaves the United States.
